# The annual crane count in Bhutan

White the completion of winter migration, the total number of Black –necked Cranes sighted in the country across all the habitats are monitored as usual and recorded by conducting a simultaneous count coordinated by the Royal Society for Protection of Nature. The count helps in understanding the population trend of the cranes. The count is normally carried out when the cranes are in their roosts.

For this season the annual count was conducted on 17 January 2014 at 0600 hrs. The date and time were fixed in close consultation








with all the stakeholders i.e. the Forest Beat Office and Gangtey Aman Kora resort in Phobjikha; Khotokha Range Office; Wangchuck Centennial Park and Ugyen Wangchuck Institute for Conservation and Environment in Bumthang and Bomdiling Range Office and Bumdeling Wildlife Sanctuary in Trashi Yangtse.

For accuracy, three counting methods were used. For direct count spotting scopes were used in all the roosts and requires repeated counting, at least four times, to get average final number. The second method used was through photography. Cranes in their different roosts were photographed and counted in a computer monitor. The final and reliable method was counting the departures from the roost and requires lot of time.




Total count of Black-necked Cranes from 1986 to 2014

It was first sighted on 25th February, 2014. White-bellied Heron is classified as critically endangered because of its extremely small and rapidly declining population, estimated to be less than 200 globally. This decline is projected to increase in the near future as a result of the loss and degradation of lowland forest and wetlands and through direct exploitation and disturbance which are the main threats.

In Bhutan, the annual 2013 WBH population survey conducted by RSPN shows 20 individuals and has increased to 22 in 2014.

n a rare sighting in Bumdeling Wildlife Sanctuary, a Chinese Pond Heron (Ardeola bacchus) was spotted near Singye Dzong at a record altitude of 3600 m in Bhutan.


The Chinese Pond Heron is an East Asian lowland freshwater bird. It is typically 47 cm (19 in) long bird with white wings, a yellow bill with a black tip, yellow eyes and legs.

Its overall colour is red, blue and white during breeding season, and greyish-brown and flecked with white at other times.

# A report on Climate Change Impact on Wetland Ecosystem in Phobjikha launched



The published research report

The report on Study of climate change impact on Wetland ecosystem Phobjikha, West Central Bhutan conducted by RSPN in collaboration with Department of Forest and Park Services with financial support from Bhutan Foundation was published by RSPN.

According to the published report, the general objective of the study was to build baseline information and to understand the impact of climate change on the wetland ecosystem. Specifically, the study aimed to compile and analyze existing meteorological data of Phobjikha valley, classify forest types and structural traits surrounding the wetland (NE & SW series) which acts as source of water to the wetland, find the impact of developmental activities on the wetland, monitor and measure water discharge from seasonal and perennial springs into the wetland and compile the vegetation and climate data to understand the current situation in respond to climate change.

phu. A cross sectorial strategy for sustainable industrial competitiveness, GPP in Bhutan is expected to scale-up public demand for environmentally and socially preferable goods, services and infrastructure, and support the achievement of Gross National Happiness and 'The Middle Path'.

G PP Project of 3.5 years in Bhutan is funded by the European Union and is expected to be driver of green growth in Bhutan.

The project consortium includes International Institute of Sustainable Development (Canada/Switzerland), Collaborating Centre on Sustainable Consumption and Production (Germany), Bhutan Chamber of Commerce and Industry, Royal Institute of Management and the Royal Society for Protection of Nature. The meeting was attended by government and public from the Ministry of Finance, Ministry of Works and Human Settlement, Druk Holding and Investment, Gross National Happiness Commission and National Environment Commission.

# World Water Day Celebration - 2014: Water and Energy

Response of the global community in celebrating World water Day on 22 March 2014 in two separate places - Wamrong and Paro.

RSPN's Field Office in Wamrong, Trashigang observed the day with Wamrong community and Tashitse Higher Secondary School by organizing an awareness campaign to sensitize the students and communities on importance of water and its conservation. The school also organized essay and slogan writing competition as part of the celebration.

Meanwhile in Paro, Bhutan Water Partnership Secretariat which is based in RSPN took the ini-

tiative to create an awareness program in collaboration with Division of Forest by organizing various activities like cleaning the banks of Pachhu, along Lango – Bonday stretch. Schools along the Pachhu took initiatives to adopt the river banks and conserve the area. jikha from 16- 18 February 2014 with the objective to encourage and promote CBST as a niche tourism destination.

The familiarization tour was attended by 27 participants, who registered through the Association of Bhutanese Tour Operators (ABTO) that serves as one of the steering committee members of the CBST project. The participants comprised representatives from 14 travel agencies, Tourism Council of Bhutan, ABTO and 10 tour guides. While several CBST activities and services were available for them, they experienced a typical sample of a CBST program of 2 days and 2 nights that gave them the opportunity to experience lifestyle of communities in Gangtey and Phobji Gewogs. Participants were made to experienced homestays and local farm activities including simple craft making, hiking, biking and cultural program. The project is supported by JICA and JEEF.

Thile the world observed the Earth Hour on 29th March 2014, several RSPN members trekked the Lungchuzekha Hiking Trail (3.5 Kms) which is about 2 hours travel time (one way). The highest point on the trail was about 3569 meters above sea level. The team trekked from Dochula Pass, climbed towards the Lungchuzekha Lhakhang (highest point on the trail) and then descended towards Yusipang via the Tashigang Gonpa covering 9.2 kms. From Lungchutse one could see the spectacular view of Mount Jomolhari, Gang Bum, Gangchen Tag, Masagang, Tsenda Gang, Teri Gang, Table mountain, Hinglae La, Gangkar Puensum and Dagala to mention few.

The trail mostly passed through conifer forest with rhododendron, juniper, hemlock and birch. The rhododendron has not yet bloomed but some primula were bright and in full blossom. We saw several bird species such as spotted nut cracker, white collared black bird, Eurasian tree sparrow and green back tit to name few. On the trail the members collected littered wastes such as sweet wrappers, plastics, PETT and glass bottles.

The trekking program was part of RSPN membership program. RSPN plans to organize such rewarding activities more frequently in future to explore Nature in all its glory.
