



THEMATIC AREAS- KEY ACHIEVEMENTS



SPECIES AND HABITAT

1.BLACK-NECKED CRANE (BNC)



Conducted BNC Annual Population Survey and recorded **676 individuals** including *101 luveniles.*



Maintained roosting for the Black-necked Crane (BNC) in WangduePhodrang District.



Initiated joint conservation project across the range countries of Black-necked Cranes 'Sacred Flyways: Securing Site Networks for the Black-necked Crane ad a Flagship Species for High Altitude Wetland Biodiversity Conservation in the central Asian Flyway'.

2.WHITE-BELLIED HERON (WBH)



Conducted WBH Annual Population Survey and recorded **25 individuals**. There is a decrease of 11% compared to the 2023 count (27 individuals).




Explored two new potential WBH nesting sites along the Lower Punatsangchhu basin and Zhemgang District.



Raised two new individuals of WBH at Whitebellied Heron Conservation Center (WBHCC).



Restored 12.5 Hectares of degraded WBH habitats along Punatsangchhu and Mangdechhu basins through forest plantation with a survival rate of over 95 percentage.



The annual roost maintenance ensures the majestic Blacknecked Cranes continue to thrive in their winter habitat, Gangtey-Phobjikha valley.



The 10-day-old female WBH chick, nurtured and raised at the WBHCC in Tsirang District, a hopeful step towards preserving this endangered species.

Bhutan, a home to over

species of birds, however more than

50

species are considered at risk and White-bellied Heron stands out with a rapidly decreasing population

with only



individuals remaining in Bhutan, the highest habitat in the region and urgently require conservation efforts to prevent further decline.



ENVIRONMENTAL EDUCATION



Engaged 728 participants (435 Female and 293 Male including students) for WBH awareness and advocacy program.



Supported eight Nature Club across six Districts along the Punatsangchhu and Mangdechhu basins.



Disseminated Environmental Education to visitors at our centers and recorded 22,600 visitors (BNCEC-22,000 visitors and WBHCC- 600 visitors).



Imparted Environmental Education to 980 youth through internship opportunities, membership programs and environment-related events.



Conducted two-day National Coordination Meeting on White-bellied Heron Conservation project and **engaged** 40 relevant stakeholders..

The **Education Advocacy Program** saw significant boost in female participation, with women making up



60% of total participants compared to 2023 Advocacy program.



Women participation brings unique perspectives on how environmental issues impact communities, particularly marginalized groups such as women and children. It underscores their crucial role in shaping conservation efforts.

WASTE AND POLLUTION



Participated in the Chubachu stream cleaning campaign on International Zero Waste Day and collected 2,667 Kilograms of solid waste.

Bhutan committed to its

'ZERO WASTE BHUTAN'

initiative, which aims to minimize waste still faces significant challenges.

SUSTAINABLE LIVELIHOODS



Trained 53 Homestay owners (39 female and 14 male) on Homestay Management from the Punatsangchhu and Mangdechhu basins and 10 homestays were certified by the Department of Tourism.

Conducted Souvenir Development training for 6 individuals (6 Male) in Berti, Zhemgang District.



Trained 12 individuals (5 female and 7 male) from the Sunkosh Ecotourism Group on Campsite Management and the Promotion of Local Products.

Supported 11 Climate Smart Agriculture sites with a total of 1,740 Agar saplings, 14,740 Teak saplings, 160 Areca nut saplings, 22 Rhododendron saplings, and 900 kgs of Mustard seed, with various high-value timber species to the Local Communities along the Punatsangchhu and Mangdechhu basins.

Around **70%**

of Bhutan's population is engaged in sustainable livelihood activities.



Supported 100 Kilometers of Electric fencing to three villages (Bara-Gumti, Zawa and Rangaytar) along Punatsangchhu and Mangdechhu basins.

35 COMMUNITIES ACROSS **11 SITES**

have adopted



a Climate-smart Agriculture approach to enhance their livelihoods in the WBH landscape, benefitting **over 600 households.**



136 households from four villages (*Lauri, Momring, Relnang, and Phajogonpa*) **initiated** Sustainable Land Management activities, including stone terracing and hedgerow planting, to enhance climate resilience.





apacity building programs with Youth and Women groups from CSA sites.



Supported Local Communities along the Punatsangchhu and Mangdechhu basins with three Oil Expellers, one flour machine, and one power tiller machine to enhance their livelihood options.



48 farmers (20 Female and 28 Male) from 11 Climate-Smart Agriculture sites **received** training on Post-harvest and packaging techniques.



Conducted ToT on Human-wildlife conflict management and guideline development for electric/ solar fencing management and engaged 25 Local Community members and Local Government officials (5 Female and 20 Male) along the Punatsangchhu and Mangdechhu basins.





WETLAND AND FRESHWATER



Supported 14 Rural Water Supply Schemes (RWSS) covering five Districts (Punakha, Trongsa, Tsirang, WangduePhodrang and Zhemgang).



Strengthened 14 existing Water Users Associations (WUAs) and conducted a ToT on Community-based Water Resource Management, and benefited 68 Local Government officials (18 Female and 50 Male) in five Districts.



Installed hot water bathing facilities for students at Lingzhi Lower Secondary School, Thimphu District.



Conducted a pilot training and ToT on spring shed management for 9 RWSS in Chhukha, Dagana, Trashigang, and Zhemgang, Districts and developed a Spring shed Management guideline.




